There nearly nine million different kinds of animals and plants in the world.

LEAST CONCERN

Animals are classified by their threat level.

The higher the threat, the more likely they are to become extinct.

"<u>Least concern</u>" animals are not currently in danger of going extinct.


Moose, white-tailed deer, raccoons, and black bears are all least concern animals.

PART I – WHOLE CLASS LESSON

CRITICALLY ENDANGERED

There are around 5000 black rhinos living in In 1995, there were only 2410 black rhinos

Other critically endangered animals include:

HABITAT LOSS

A <u>habitat</u> is where an animal lives.

This might be a rainforest, the ocean, grasslands, or a desert.

A habitat has shelter, water, food, and space for the animal.



The red-eyed tree frog has declining numbers, but they are currently classified as <u>least concern</u>.

Part I introduces endangered animals and five of the classes – least concern, vulnerable, endangered, critically-endangered, and extinct.






