EARTH'S RAINFORESTS




A rainforest is a dense forest that gets lots of rainfall.

The vegetation (plants) grows very well in rainforests

WHAT MAKES A RAINFOREST?

- lots of rainfall
- · Many rivers and streams
- · Dense vegetation (plant life)
- Lots of different plant and animal species (biodiversity)
- Rich soil
- Consistent temperatures year-round





FOUR RAINFOREST LAYERS

Rainforests have four layers:

- Emergent
- Canopy
- Understory
- Forest floor




CANOPY LAYER

The <u>canopy</u> layer is below the emergent layer.

The canopy is full of thick vegetation
that forms a "roof" over the two layers below.

This is a very wet layer. This can be too much water for some trees!

Canopy trees often have glossy, pointed leaves that repel water.




