




Idea #3: Create a Low-Prep B2S Bulletin Board




Each and every year, I present a lesson on "Just Right Books."

Idea #7: Booktalk September 11, 2001 Titles





The statistics are completely made up...but you might find some truth in them anyway.


Idea #13: Decorate Your Library Walls with a Theme

It's always fun to have a decorating theme to keep your library looking fresh and updated year after year. Some of my favorites themes are outer space, camping, and superheroes.

Adding a themed word wall is one easy way to decorate while adding instructional value to your library space. You can refer to important words like "citation," "keyword," and "resource" when teaching the research process to older students.

For young students, you can use the smaller vocab cards with a pocket chart or staple the cover of a "big book" on a bulletin board to label the parts of a book. Other signs like "book return" and "scanner" are perfect for labeling items in the library to show environmental print.


Who to Follow: Jennifer LaGarde on Instagram
