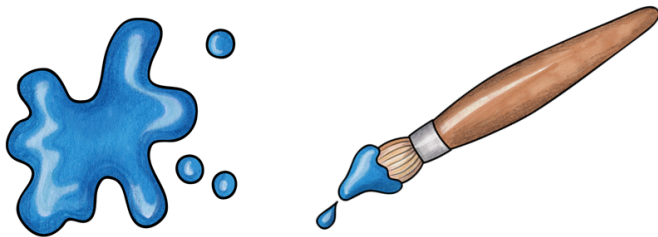

The Darién Gap is a thick jungle area that connects Panama and Colombia.

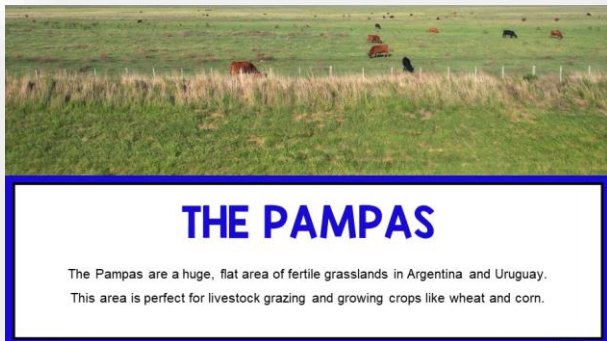
It is nearly impossible to drive a car or motorbike through. The jungle is too thick, and there are rivers that can only be crossed on foot (no boats).

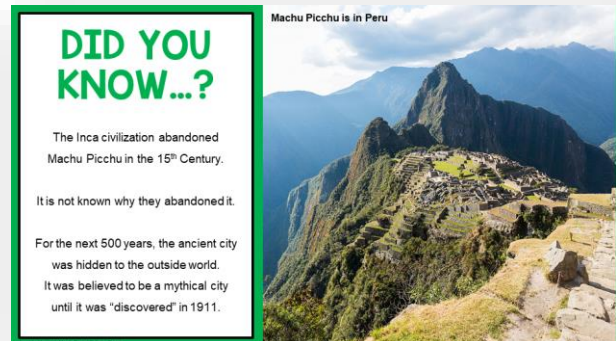


