Happy Fall Y'all! Don't miss this fun activity that will engage your library patrons in a practice session on locating call numbers!



This Eclipse Library Lesson will ensure your students understand the differences between solar and lunar eclipses and why solar eclipses are such a big deal.



October is Breast Cancer Awareness Month





Idea #11: Practice Fall-Themed Library Catalog Skills



After incorporating a dozen or so picture book baskets for my little ones, I am seriously considering a total transformation from shelves to baskets.




Idea #15: A Simple Lesson to Encourage Using the Library Website


