ELECTROCARDIOGRAM

An **electrocardiogram** or **ECG** (sometimes called **EKG**), is a test that shows how your heart is beating.


Small sensors on your chest, arms, and legs record the heart's electrical signals.

Doctors use an **ECG** to check if the heart is healthy or if there are any problems with its rhythm.



Complex Sentences

- Complex sentences contain **one independent** clause and **one dependent** clause.
- If the dependent clause is first, you need to separate it with a comma.
- If the dependent clause is after the independent clause, a comma is not needed.

Examples:
My internet keeps going out because it's raining.
Because it's windy outside, my internet keeps going out.
